# Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC)

The Bethel Public Schools administer these assessments in the spring each year and are required to do so in Grades 3-8.

## **EdSight**

Edsight is the CT education data portal that integrates information from over 30 different sources—some reported by districts and others from external sources. Information is available on key performance measures that make up the Next Generation Accountability System, as well as dozens of other topics, including school finance, special education, staffing levels and school enrollment.

## **NWEA Measuring What Matters**

During each school year, students in grades Kindergarten through 11 will take the NWEA Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment. The first administration takes place at various times across the district, during the first few months of the school year.

#### What are NWEA Map Assessments?

MAP assessments are unique in that they are adaptive tests students take on a computer that adjust for learning levels. The test becomes more difficult as students answer questions correctly and when students incorrectly answer a question, the test becomes easier.

### How will the information be used?

MAP assessments are a powerful tool for monitoring student growth over time and provides information for teachers that help us to best meet the needs of all students. We have access to data that helps us determine a student's instructional level in Reading and Math and measure academic growth throughout the school year, as well as from year to year.
